Pastoral Pondering ... Moving a Hydrangea

In front of the parsonage there is a beautiful hydrangea, leaves extended to take in the sunlight, sharing its flowering blooms for all. This hydrangea has endured some change this year. You see it used to live at the corner of the parsonage. However, because of the new patio, the plant needed to be relocated. It was a planned transition, but that did not make it any easier. I created a new place ready to receive this flowering plant, but the process of removing it was not easy. It had grown deep roots and thrived there on the corner. After a lot of digging and gentle pulling I was able to move it to its new home. I quickly brought dirt to put back around the exposed roots, even moving some of the soil from its previous location, so that there was some familiar ground along with the new. After the move in, I watered the hydrangea, so that the roots could get a much-needed drink and settle into their new home. Day by day I watered it to make sure the transition went as well as possible. But the hydrangea looked sad. The leaves hung down and wrinkled. One of the branches had a bit of damage from the move. I was worried that it might not do well with all the change. I hoped that it would settle in and begin to thrive. After time, new leaves began to sprout and old leaves slowly fell away. As the hydrangea turned leafy green, it looked happier. Then after a little more time and water, new buds appeared, it was beginning to bloom where it was planted. Even the damaged branch put forth leaves and flowers in this new season.

One year ago, the Holy Spirit uprooted Pastor Dena and I from a place we called home and transplanted us into this new land with all of you. Much like the hydrangea, moving is a process. You have been gracious and welcoming in this time of transition and newness. It takes time to settle in a new location, because there are more than boxes to unpack. Relocating brings with it a time of letting go of previous leaves so that new ones have space to grow. Sometimes, there are spots that get damaged. They might bloom for a season and then need pruned, and that is ok. There is a lot that gives us life, watering our hearts and spirits with an aquifer of love. We bring with us all the seasons of growing and blooming that have come before. Now we give thanks for the new shoots, branches and blooms that will grow in the seasons ahead. May we be deeply rooted and grounded in God's Love. May the light of Jesus Christ continue to shine brightly upon and through us. May the Holy Spirit inspire new growth within and among us, so that we may thrive together.

- General Fund: \$52,238.94
- Building Fund: \$31,748.93

All insurance and property taxes have been paid in full for the year.

Next Church Council meeting will include a comprehensive review of quarterly comparison data for discussion.

Finance Committee will meet again in Oct/Nov.

September 30th deadline for committees to turn in budgets for 2024.

Pastor Report:

Pastor Lee is on vacation for two weeks so there will be no formal Pastor Report for September. Council noted and recognized the increased and unfortunate need for pastoral care and funeral services recently and appreciates the support Pastor Lee provides to the affected families.

New Business Discussed:

Eric Andersen joined the Council to discuss potential capital improvement projects. The conversation focused on offsetting future energy costs and taking advantage of rebate programs by installing solar panels. Basic information has been obtained; additional quotes and information will be gathered before further discussion. The Council will ask the Property Committee to outline any additional projects expected in future years as roof repairs for the sanctuary building may also be forthcoming. Any decisions for large projects will be voted on by church members.

Upcoming Committee Meetings and Updates:

1)**Worship and Music:** The committee is planning the worship calendar for the rest of the year and has outlined the following worship schedule for specialized Sundays:

- a. October 8th Quilts and Casseroles Sunday! Quilt dedication during the service with casserole fellowship meal following.
- b. October 22nd Pastor Appreciation Sunday
- c. October 29th Confirmation Sunday and Reformation Sunday students having completed confirmation will be celebrated and acknowledged. Reformation Sunday will include presenting Bibles to 3 year olds,

2nd graders, and beginning confirmation students to recognize Martin Luther's mantra to get God's Word into the hands of all people. Church Council meeting to follow worship.

- d. November 5th All Saints Sunday remembrance through lighting of candles and displaying photos of loved ones who have passed away. Following worship will be an Aebleskiver Dinner. Jean Loger is leading the planning and more information will be forthcoming.
- e. December 10th Children's Christmas Program
- f. December 24th Christmas Eve Service Christmas Eve falls on a Sunday this year. There will be no morning worship this day. Christmas Eve Service will be at 4:30pm.

- Worship and Music Committee stressed the need for volunteers for weekly services. They will potentially reach out to members via phone calls during the week if enough volunteers have not been obtained for the upcoming Sunday service.

- There is an old drum set that the committee no longer needs and wishes to offer to church members. If no church members are interested in the set, it will be donated.

2) Technology Committee: New monitor for the secretary office has been installed and is operational.

3) Mutual Ministry: This committee's goal is to meet quarterly. They have a pending meeting in October.

4) **Property Committee:** Their next meeting will be on Monday, November 6th at 7pm

5) **Education Committee:** Meeting held on Sunday, September 17th to review the new Sunday School curriculum with teacher volunteers. The new curriculum is more interactive and engaging for students and has been well received thus far. Additional pamphlet inserts have been ordered to supplement the new teacher guidebooks. Additionally, confirmation students received new course books during the September 13th confirmation classes.

6) Farm Committee: Committee will be reviewing bids in October.

Closing Prayer: The Council Members said the Lord's Prayer in unison.

Next Meeting: Sunday, October 29, 2023 concluding worship; approximately 10:45am

(Yes, that is his name) He has an interesting past and a real come to Jesus story. I think that when we get busy in life, we sometimes forget to pray until we really get in a pinch. At LSI, we celebrate all the ways professional caregivers help children and adults achieve their goals and build meaningful connections in their communities. LSI's Host Homes program is an innovative way Direct Support Professionals serve adults with disabilities.

Through this program, an individual moves from Supported Community Living into a private family home with a carefully selected Host Homes Provider who provides 24/7 support for the client.

"Working directly with my clients to help them complete goals and work around obstacles is my favorite part of my job," said Erica Hill Murray, a Host Homes Provider at LSI. "I enjoy showing them that there are people in their lives who care about them, are proud of them, and proud to help them."

Erica has helped many clients in the five years she has provided care at LSI, but one client, in particular, has made great strides under her care.

"I worked with a client who wanted to find a job or volunteer position, but she had two obstacles in her way: she had trouble using a computer, and she wasn't confident in her ability to speak in an interview," said Erica. "I offered to look for positions on the computer with her and to call potential employers to explain what she was looking for. After working with her, we found her a volunteer position for a couple of days a week, and she was delighted."

"She thanked me for helping her and said that she was happy that, for once, someone understood her drive to want to work," said Erica. "I like to make a difference – even if it is small. Helping others, no matter at what level, is impactful. I love working at LSI, and I believe my position as a Host Homes Provider has been my favorite position in life."
